

Pastor's Page

Dear Family of God,

September is a popular time to think about education, for that is the month where we think about back to school and even our educational programs at the church kick off again. As you think about education, I want you read about the term *Cultural Liturgy* and how that relates to education and formation in children.

James K.A. Smith has become one of my favorite authors in the church. He has coined the term "cultural liturgies." This term and the subsequent meaning of it is true. Smith writes that "liturgies—whether 'sacred' or 'secular'—shape and constitute our identities by forming the fundamental desires and our most basic attunement to the world. In short, liturgies make us certain kinds of people, and what defines us is what we love." (Desiring the Kingdom, 25) Smith defines that when he uses the word liturgy, he means worship.

The two books that I read from Smith up this point include the one mentioned *Desiring the Kingdom* and *You are What You Love: The Spiritual Power of Habit*. In both of these books he discusses this term of cultural liturgy. He also in these books discusses education, even the education of children. I want you to think about what Smith says when it comes to education as formation. "If education is primarily formation—and more specifically, the formation of our desires—then that means education is happening all over the place (for good or for ill)." (Desiring the Kingdom, 19). Therefore, education is even happening in the home. The home is the most important place for faith education to occur as well. The daily rituals and life in the home, along with conversations between parents and children are all educational, that is, formational.

When parents teach their children, they be teaching not just for the head, but for the whole of the person. When it comes to the faith, parents along with the church support teach the head knowledge of the Christian faith. Parents also need to realize how they impact their children in other ways may teach something far different than the Christian faith depending how they live and prioritize their families and their



children's lives. One clear example of this is do I take my kids to their sporting activity (or other activity) rather than church on Sunday or Catechism class on Wednesday. A parent could be teaching their child the faith at home when it comes to the head knowledge but be teaching something far different in how they live their life.

Smith tells us in his book, *Desiring the Kingdom*: "We are what we love, and our love is shaped, primed, and aimed by our liturgical practices that take hold of our gut and aim our heart to certain ends." (40). It is really what we do that takes hold of our whole person. Education and training for the kingdom of God needs to be more than just imparting head knowledge, it needs to touch each aspect of the child's life, including the heart.

When that parent takes a child to an athletic event over church, they are showing what is more important to them. They are following what they love.

James Smith actually appeals to Martin Luther in his writing as he connects cultural practices, liturgies, and the worship of one's god. He writes, "To say 'you are what you love' is synonymous with saying, 'you are what you worship.' The great Reformer Martin Luther once said, 'Whatever your heart clings to and confides in, that is really your god.' We become what we worship because we worship what we love." When parents orient their families toward actions and priorities that do not reflect faith in Christ, they are forming their child to trust in a different god than the true God.

Parents are spiritually forming their children whether they realize it or not by what they are doing. Secular liturgies is a tool that Satan uses to take people away from worshiping the Lord God almighty. Smith writes this piece:

'Secular' liturgies are fundamentally formative, and implicit in them is a vision of the kingdom that needs to be discerned and evaluated. From the perspective of Christian faith, these secular liturgies will often constitute a mis-formation of our desires—aiming our heart away from the Creator to some aspects of the creation as it were God. Secular liturgies capture our hearts by capturing our imaginations and drawing us into ritual practices that 'teach' us to love something very different from the Kingdom of God.

As we see what Smith means about the impact of liturgy in the world and in the home, he points out that God's people "might have Bible verses on the wall in every room of the house and yet the unspoken rituals reinforce self-centeredness rather than sacrifice." (You are What You Love, 127). He goes on to suggest that "each household and family does well to take an audit of its daily routines, looking at them through a liturgical lens. What Story is carried in those rhythms?" (You Are What You Love, 128). As this audit takes place it is important to keep in mind what needs to be in place in the Christian home, which Smith says is that "they are caught up in the wider household of God." (128). Smith even says: "The liturgies of our homes should grow out of out, and amplify, the formation liturgy of Word and Table." (128).

Smith encourages God's families to use the liturgical practices in the home. One way to do this is to follow the Church Year in your home. He also points to the practicality of the Baptismal candle so that each year, you remember your baptism on your baptism birthday.

Here are just a few examples for how you can focus on the Church Year in your homes.

Connecting Family to the Church Year

"The rhythms of Advent and Christmas, Epiphany and Pentecost, Lent and Easter are a unique way to live into the life of Jesus." (129)

- 1. Incorporate the Colors of the Church Year into your home.
- 2. Advent Make and use of an Advent Wreath during the season of Advent.
 - a. Advent Wreath for Building and Playing Wicking Vicar (google Wicking Vicar Advent wreath)

- 3. Lent—Observe a form of fasting. (129)
- 4. The *Lutheran Service Book* has a listing of the colors for each part of the church year on page x in the front part of the hymnal.
- During Advent and Lent, use the provided devotionals that connect to the midweek worship series.
- 6. Christmas Eve—read the Christmas Story.
- 7. Holy Week—Read the Passion Narrative and watch *The Passion of the Christ*.



I encourage each and every household whether you have children at home or not to look and see how your lives are affected by the liturgies in your daily activities and to see if they mesh with worshipping the one true God.

Envelope Giving for July: General Fund Envelopes: \$7123.02 Missions: \$538 Building Fund: \$209 Gifts and memorials: \$200 Sunday School offering: \$0 Daycare income (envelopes) \$136 Air Conditioning: \$200 Vacation Bible School: \$0 Oil Well Schultz: \$305.98 Misc Income: \$305.98 Lutheran Hour: \$0 Cemetery Fund \$0 Thrivent Choice Dollars \$0 Current Bank Accounts: Salem Church Checking: \$34174.64 Savings: \$17324.97 Daycare Checking: \$34174.64 LCEF Account: \$28944.72. General fund envelope giving is down about \$8000 so far this year compared to last year. MaryAnn got a quote from Hoff Financial. After a discussion about Accounting agencies, Chris Severt made a motion to move our financials/accounting to Hoff Financial starting September 1. Josh seconded the motion and the motion was carried. MaryAnn will call Matt Hoff to get it switched. A motion was made by Chris Severt to accept the minutes and seconded by Paul Millerman and motion carried.

Elder's Report: Paul Millerman advised that there were no transfers or releases. Bud and Pastor are visiting shut-ins. The Shepherd of the Valley trip went very well. New cross on the bell tower is up. ALICE training will be October 5 from 6:30 to 8 pm. Pastor discussed getting out to visit people with issues or concerns. A full time teacher (Katelyn Hendren) and a full time assistant (Holly Wilhelmi). September calendar and curriculum are done. A motion was made by MaryAnn Thompson to accept the minutes and seconded by Josh Millerman and motion carried.
